which you act as animal or plant cell organelles and perform basic cell functions. Your mission
is to understand the job of your organelles and describe how cell organelles interact with each
other. There is a twist: you will create a scene (ex: school, soccer team, friends, etc.) and create
roles for each organelle based on your scene (ex: in a school, the nucleus would be the principal).
Once you have developed roles for each organelle, each person in your group will choose one
they want to act as and your group will create a short play highlighting your roles! Other groups
will attempt to identify which organelle each person is acting as.
